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Bishop Museum Announces New Display: *Two Hawaiian Olympic Champions. The First and the Latest.*

*Display celebrating Duke Kahanamoku and Carissa Moore to debut
during the Hawai'i International Film Festival World Premiere of WATERMAN*

Honolulu, Hawai'i — Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum is proud to announce a new display in the Gulab and Indru Watumull Atrium in historic Hawaiian Hall: *Two Hawaiian Olympic Champions. The First and the Latest*. The display will debut during the Hawai'i International Film Festival World Premiere of WATERMAN on Friday, November 5, 2021 on the Museum's Great Lawn.

Two Hawaiian Olympic Champions juxtaposes Duke Paoa Kahanamoku and Carissa Kainani Moore, celebrating two individuals living 100 years apart yet sharing the same story – one of respect and aloha for Hawai'i and the world.

"Bishop Museum is very proud to honor two Native Hawaiian Olympic Gold Medalists together in this display – Duke being the first such winner, in 1912, and Carissa as the most recent, in 2021," said Brandon Bunag, Bishop Museum vice president of public programs and interim director of Education. "Bishop Museum are the stewards of irreplaceable cultural treasures including a replica of one of Duke Kahanamoku's most famous surfboards made in the 1930's, as well as his numerous awards and accolades, including his Olympic gold medals. The *Two Hawaiian Olympic Champions* display will feature this replica of Duke's surfboard along with one of his Olympic gold medals side-by-side Carissa Moore's Olympic gold medal, and the surfboard that helped her win it."

"We hope that this display will inspire the next generation to strive for excellence, honor those that have come before us, and leave a legacy that will last long past us," said Bunag.

To control Museum capacity, we will be offering a maximum of 125 tickets per hour of operation.

Timed General Admissions can be booked on the hour from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at

Once a timed admission is booked, please arrive at any time during your check-in hour. Arriving after your hour reservation check-in window by more than 15 minutes may require entry on a space-available basis. All admissions once checked in, are welcome to stay until close of business.

If you currently hold a pre-purchased Admission ticket that is still valid, those tickets will be honored on a space-available basis on the day of attendance.

Per the City & County of Honolulu’s recent order*, effective Monday, September 13, 2021 all visitors to Bishop Museum age 12 and older must provide the following:

- Proof of full COVID-19 vaccination, and a valid photo ID; or
- Proof of a negative COVID-19 test taken within 48 hours, and a valid photo ID

Proof of vaccination includes:

- A hardcopy of a Hawai‘i State-approved vaccination card (photocopies and digital copies are acceptable); or
- A Hawai‘i State-approved app confirming full vaccination status

A map of COVID-19 testing sites can be found on the City & County of Honolulu’s [OneOahu.org website](#). Not all sites offer free testing and their hours may fluctuate from day to day, so please call them to confirm their hours and pricing.

Please note that the negative test result required must be from an FDA approved, or FDA EUA approved, molecular or antigen test. The Museum is not able to accept any undated negative COVID-19 test results.

Prior to entering the Museum, guests will be asked to undergo a temperature check. Guests are also asked to wear face masks and practice social distancing, both indoors and outdoors, during their visit.
